It is hard to believe that we are already 1st quarter into the 2024-2025 of school! It has been an amazing start to the school year! My welcome back message to our students was centered around: Work Hard/Be Nice/Be great people. If we all do those three things on a daily basis we should see great successes.

Our students and staff have been very busy during our first quarter. Our students have had some great learning opportunities on various field trips and in our community. We had one of our own compete and place highly at the National FFA Convention. We celebrated a great homecoming week, a great dress up week in the middle school and celebrated our students of the month and have seen many more successes in the middle and high school.

The addition of a Wildcat Time (formerly called resource) for all students, grades 6-12 has been a positive addition to our day. This is a 30 minute period after Block two. At the beginning of each week teachers check in with their students on their VITALS (grade/absences/behaviors/positives and area for growth). We have also implemented a curriculum called Wayfinder during our Wildcat Time. The green form can be picked up in the high school office and outside of the middle school office.

We have our KEEPING KIDS WARM program up and running at Edgar Schools for all students in grades 4K-12. We appreciate the community donations we receive to help fund this program.

# Edgar Middle/High School Quarterly Newsletter Highlights from our classrooms

#### **Business**

Accounting I & II - Accounting students have been introduced to basic financial concepts, such as how to record transactions and understand balance sheets and income statements. They are also exploring the many jobs in the accounting field. We have several students in Accounting I and a few in Accounting II so it is great to see them working together on projects and assignments.

Sports Entertainment Marketing - Students in SEM are exploring how to promote sports events, teams, and athletes by understanding concepts like branding, sponsorship, and fan engagement. They also learn about market research, social media strategies, and the business side of sports to attract and retain fans and sponsors. We started on a team research project and by the end of the semester, they will be shared in class.

Intro to Business -In our Intro to Business class we are learning fundamental concepts such as entrepreneurship, business operations, and the role of businesses in the economy. They explore topics like marketing, finance, and management as well. We also did a unit on Marketing and Advertising where they created commercials for the Wildcat Den store.

Desktop Publishing -These students are learning about Microsoft Word, Excel, and PowerPoint. Once we master some of those skills we will be learning about more tools to create visually appealing documents like flyers, brochures, and newsletters. We are discussing how fonts, colors, and other easy changes can effectively communicate information to the expected audience. We are designing through digital and print media.

#### Science

<u>Biology</u> Biology students spent the majority of the quarter learning about ecology and population biology. The highlight for students was a walking field trip up to Minnow Ponds to gather organisms that were placed in an ecological energy pyramid. Students also worked on their graphing abilities while learning about real world examples of population dynamics.



Towards the end of the quarter, biology students switched gears learning about cells, and completed microscope labs including samples that were prepared and also samples that students made themselves.

<u>Environmental Science</u> Students in this class made the most out of the mild fall season, completing various labs and field experiences in our surrounding ecosystem. Students put on waders and completed a freshwater mussel survey of the Rib River, and were able to identify multiple native freshwater species. In addition, classes conducted various tests that were used to determine the overall health of the Scotch Creek. Throughout the week three chemical tests along with a macro/micro-invertebrate assessment, temperature, pH, and flow tests were completed. To finish the quarter, students learned about invasive species that inhabit Wisconsin while cutting buckthorn out of our school forest.









Hello from the middle school science classroom! The seventh graders wrapped up the last two books of our Earth science series and started out with the physical science series. Units one and two take a deep dive into energy. What it is, its laws, transferring, and transforming. We will be combining both units into one summative project, creating a cardboard roller coaster! There are two parts to this: the assembly/building portion and a written application of knowledge written portion. The eight graders are studying life science. We are currently focused on a large biome project that includes material from unit three and four. Students will put together a poster that applies what we have learned in class to a biome found somewhere in the world.

#### **Social Studies**

The Social Studies department as a whole has been putting an emphasis on vocabulary instruction. Building content specific vocabulary can help our students be more successful readers of all nonfiction texts. At the Middle School level the 6th grade students have covered some of the major ancient civilizations such as Mesopotamia, Egypt and Kush, and India. Activities in our class have included performances, map skills, drawing advertisements, and



making podcasts. Our next areas of study include ancient China, Greece, and Rome. The 7th grade students are well into their American history class having covered European exploration

of the continent, colonization, and the American Revolution. They are now writing essays on how the Constitution guards against tyranny. The 8th grade students have chosen a research topic for their National History Day projects. The theme for this year's competition is "Rights and Responsibilities" – a purposefully vague theme which allows a wide variety of topics from the Salem Witch Trials to the Protestant Reformation; from the 2nd Amendment of the US Constitution to legislation passed in Nazi Germany. All students will have their project rough drafts handed in by Friday, November 22. A message will soon go out to all families concerning the local competition at Edgar, which is held in January.

In the High School, our Contemporary United States History class, students are diving into the Gilded Age by researching the titans of industry, exploring their impact on society and the economy. Meanwhile, the Global Issues class is gaining foundational knowledge in economics, covering essential concepts like GDP, world trade, and the differences between micro and macroeconomics to better understand today's interconnected world.

#### **ELA**

During the first quarter, 6th grade ELA students have been studying Greek Mythology and reading The Lightning Thief book one of the Percy Jackson and the Olympians series by Rick Riordan. They have been learning about the Greek Gods and Goddesses and completed a reader's theater to act out some of the myths, legends, and creatures referenced in the class novel. While reading the focus has been on improving skills of identifying chapter gist, theme, and point of view. Along with the novel study students are reviewing sentence structure and formation to improve their writing.

During the first quarter, 7th grade ELA students with Mrs. Guldan have been studying the Lost Children of Sudan and reading <u>A Long Walk to Water</u> by Linda Sue Park. Students have expanded their knowledge of environmental hardships in foreign countries and the consequences of war including displacement, family separation, and refugee camps. Students will continue to expand their inquiry of topics into the second quarter by conducting their research on one of the topics and writing a paper.



The first quarter's grammar focus has been on nouns including identifying appositives, direct objects, and pronouns. These skills will help develop sentence structure and variety.

In ELA this quarter, 8th graders have been reading *Summer of the Mariposas* by Guadalupe Garcia McCall, with a focus on identifying themes, summarizing key passages, building vocabulary, and participating in formal book discussions. Through targeted vocabulary work, students have expanded their understanding of complex language in the text, while theme analysis and summary activities help them connect story elements to broader concepts. These skills come together in structured discussions, where students share insights and deepen their analytical skills.

During the first quarter of English 9, learners have been mining their memories though journal writing in order to develop a personal narrative. In addition to learning the correct usage of pronouns, students have also been tested on the skills of indirect/direct characterization, inferencing, cause and effect, and irony through the readings of the classic short stories, "The Necklace," and "The Most Dangerous Game." Learners also showcased a personal choice book by completing a book talk at the end of the quarter.

#### **ELA 10**

Students in Sophomore English class have studied a variety of genres this quarter and have continued to sharpen their writing skills. We started the quarter with a deep dive and author study on Ray Bradbury and some of his varied works. We then moved into reading a play together before creating comic strips to focus on summary techniques for the key parts of the play. Students have continued to work on writing solid sentences and paragraphs throughout quarter one. Students also learned about a famous Wisconsin native who has a day of remembrance for her in the state of Wisconsin. We are currently in a short story unit with varied types of stories and plot lines. With each unit of study, students continue to analyze literature using Elements of Literature. Students continue to compare and contrast varied



works which we study together and different formats of the works. Keep up the great work Sophomores!

#### **ELA 11**

Mrs. Reissmann's Junior English class has studied a wide variety of genres and topics in quarter one. Students started the year with a unit devoted to Stephen King and varied types of works from him. (Not all that Stephen King writes is scary!) Students have done independent research for different units to include one related to Social Media which culminated in a debate. Students have read a book and are working on continual improvement in writing five-paragraph essays as they get closer to taking the ACT. As part of the book unit, students also created and presented a Google Slides presentation. We also fit in a small unit on poetry where we dissected poems together and practiced analyzing poetry using Poetic Devices. We are currently reading and discussing the play *The Crucible*. Students are relating the play to events in history and modern day. Students will be again writing a five-paragraph essay at the end of this unit. Keep up the great work Juniors!

#### Math

#### Middle School Math

The middle school utilizes Open Resources for our math curriculum. This is a problem-based curriculum where students spend most of their time in class working on carefully crafted and sequenced problems. Teachers help students understand the problems, ask questions to push their thinking, and ensure discussions to ensure the mathematical takeaways are clear. Students gain a rich and lasting understanding of mathematical concepts and procedures and experience applying this knowledge to new situations. Students frequently work together with their classmates—they talk about math, listen to each other's ideas, justify their thinking, and critique the reasoning of others. They gain experience communicating their ideas both verbally and in writing, developing skills that will serve them well throughout their lives. This kind of instruction may look different from what you experienced in your own math education. Over time, students gain the skills and the confidence to independently solve problems that they've never seen before.



Eighth-grade students have covered Rigid Transformations & Congruence and Dilations, Similarity, & Introducing Slope. Seventh-grade students have explored Scale Drawings and Introduction to Proportional Relationships. Sixth-grade students have demonstrated their understanding of Area & Surface Area and an Introduction to Ratios. If you have any questions please contact the middle school math department.

### **Agriculture and Welding**

1st Block: Animal Science

Animals Science has spent the 1st quarter focused on Dairy Science and everything that surrounds the dairy industry. Our topics have included animal nutrition, husbandry, genetics and animal health. We have been able to visit 2 area farms to apply our learning concepts in addition to attending the World Dairy Expo.

2nd block: Advanced Welding

Advanced welding spend the 1st quarter completing the Northcentral Technical College curriculum and students earn two college credits. Throughout the quarter the class covered Shielded Metal Arc Welding, Gas Metal Arc Welding. Flux Core Arc Welding, and Gas Tungsten Arc Welding. Grades consisted of quizzes and work orders where we learned how to read welding symbols to complete welding tasks within the shop.

3rd block: Beginning Welding

The approach to Beginning Welding is to teach the skill and develop a passion for welding. We spend the majority of our time in the shop area learning how to weld through several applications. We covered stick welding, MIG welding, TIG welding, Oxy Fuel Torch, Flux Core, and are currently learning Plasma Cam. The grading in this quarter consisted primarily of welding billets with the different processes.

In Mr. Streit's Intro to Tech class, students recently completed a graphics unit where they were able to create various projects using Adobe Photoshop. They then completed a unit on engineering drawing. They first used paper for their drawing principles and then transitioned to computer drawings. This foundational knowledge prepared them for the exciting transition to the woods unit, where they will apply their new skills to hands-on woodworking projects. The students are eager to begin crafting and learning about various tools and techniques used in woodworking.

Woods 2 students have taken their skills to the next level, developing cornhole boards as a class project. These boards showcase their craftsmanship and integrate design and construction techniques. In addition to the group project, each student is working on individual projects, allowing them to apply their creativity and create something unique and personal.

These projects have helped them practice precision, attention to detail, and problem-solving as they worked through the challenges of creating functional and aesthetically pleasing pieces.

#### Notes from the Nurse

As I begin a leave of absence, I wanted to take a moment to share a few things with you. Mostly, I want to assure you that I am leaving the health office in good hands while I am away. Lisa Nowicki, BSN, RN is my replacement for the rest of the school year. Lisa has many years of nursing experience and has transitioned into school nursing easily. She has been learning her role alongside me since the beginning of the school year. If you need to reach her, you can call the health office or email her at <a href="mailto:lnowicki@mcse.k12.wi.us">lnowicki@mcse.k12.wi.us</a> Lisa will be at school 1-2 days a week, and will be covering other schools the other days. Of course, Mandy Myszka, our longtime health aide will also be working in the health office over the school year; she is there Monday through Friday. I intend to return to my role for the 2025-26 school year.

The health office team has a few items we wanted to cover as we enter into the second quarter.

### Emergency room/urgent care/walk-in/tele-doc/virtual visits

o If you are prescribed medications at one of these types of visits, tell them you need a school medication authorization form signed by the provider and the child's



guardian. We are not able to give prescription medications without this, and often we are unable to track down the provider to sign one after the fact. Ask while you are at the hospital, clinic, or virtual appointment.

 Provider-signed medication authorizations can be dropped off at school, emailed to Lisa or Mandy, or faxed to the school at 715-352-3198.

### Pneumonia and Pertussis (whooping cough)

- Both of these are contagious and can spread.
- Bacterial pneumonia (Mycoplasma pneumoniae) is active in the area this fall and will likely persist through the winter. This is also sometimes called "walking pneumonia" because not everyone is ill enough that they are down and out. It often requires treatment with an antibiotic. There is no vaccine for this illness. Info on symptoms and treatments can be found on the CDC website.

  - We have had several cases of pneumonia already this school year, some in each level- elem/middle/high school. If your child has an ongoing cough or recurring fever, let their provider know that there have been cases of pneumonia at school.
- Whooping cough (Pertussis) is also on the rise in central Wisconsin. It can cause a severe cough that lasts for weeks to months, with ill people sometimes coughing to the point of vomiting or passing out. Antibiotics can help if started early enough.
   There is a vaccine to help prevent this illness. Info on symptoms and treatments can be found on the CDC website.

  - If a child tests positive for Pertussis, they will need to complete 5 days of antibiotic treatment before returning to school.

### Sleep and the end of Daylight Savings Time

- Kids need enough sleep to be productive and successful at school. Kids have a multitude of reasons for not getting enough sleep, but right now, some will be struggling with the time change. Here are some steps you can take to help your child adjust.
  - Get bright light shortly after waking. Sunlight is best, but if that's not possible, bright artificial light can also help.



- Try to get outside in the evening as the sun is setting. This can help the brain reset the circadian rhythm, leading to better sleep.
- Keep light levels low in the evening. Use lamps instead of overhead lighting when possible. Avoid use of screens in the hours leading up to bed time. This supports natural melatonin production.
- Finally, keep sleep and wake times similar (within 45-60 min) all week long, including weekends. Keeping routine sleep-wake schedule leads to a solid circadian rhythm.

#### NONDISCRIMINATION

This policy also prohibits harassment.

The district encourages informal resolution of complaints under this policy. A formal complaint resolution procedure is available, however, to address allegations of violations of the policy in the Edgar School District. For complaint procedures see Board Policies 1422, 2260, 2421, 3122, 4122, and 5517.
